At the March Council meeting topics discussed included the following:

Council gave enthusiastic support for a new Outreach activity 'Cooking in Community' spearheaded by Marilyn King and Chris Karges by which they will use the church kitchen to teach community members basic cooking skills and how to stretch the food dollar, starting this Fall – awesome initiative ladies!

Judy Jones' Transfer of Membership was accepted from her former church in B.C. and she has volunteered to become our Regional Representative – WELCOME, and THANK YOU Judy!

Property topics for discussion and planning have included brick work on the south wall, resurfacing the inside of the east wall in the Sanctuary, and getting the carpets in the Sanctuary re-stretched Karen Gerretsen has started playing piano for us – welcome, and THANK YOU Karen!

On a personal note, I am very happy and encouraged to see new faces again popping up at Worship. I have also been hearing stories of Trinity being recognized in the community as a place with a lot of things going on. We now host several groups and activities on a regular basis including Ramadan prayers and Tae Kwon Do lessons to name just a couple. Trinity United is gaining a reputation as being a very welcoming, inclusive, approachable community within North Perth – thank you to everyone's efforts which have made this recognition possible.

Stewardship and Finance

In the short month of February when weather and vacations tend to decrease attendance, our monthly targets for donations and fundraising revenues are low. PAR givings met expectations for February and electronic givings were \$405.

Expenses exceeded revenues for the month of February by \$24,684. Paying for the Sanctuary Lights was the key contributor to this shortfall as the grant for \$19,000 was not received until early March. The cumulative loss for 2024 was \$10,144 if the Sanctuary Light Project is excluded.

The expenses for February also included some higher than normal regular bills for items like snow removal (\$1,278), natural gas (\$1,306) and \$1,521 for repairs to the heating system.

M&S Givings were also lower than projected with year to date givings being \$1,425 under plan.

These loss positions are made up by the end of the year but Trinity must keep large balances interest-free in its bank account to cover these losses in the early months of the year. If more members signed up for the P.A.R. monthly giving plan, it would spread revenues more evenly throughout the year. If you are interested in switching to this easy method of supporting the church, please contact the church office.

Trinity celebrated Listowel's Irish heritage with a Shamrock Supper held on March 12. We would like to thank everyone who helped prepare the meal or supported the event by purchasing a ticket. Over 90 people attended enjoying a dinner of Irish Beef Stew, salads and a selection of homemade desserts.

The feedback received indicates that everyone who attended had a good time – making the event a social success.

The dinner was also successful as a fundraiser for the church. The revenue from ticket sales and purchase of left overs exceeded the cost of the meal by about \$1,400. This money goes to support the ongoing operations of the church.

name, is a story about teen girls working on Ontario farms to ensure food supply during World War II, while our men were overseas in the fight for freedoms and democracy. Trinity's own pioneering Miriam Carter was one of those teen girls who went after adventure and independence along with hard work and 10-hour days picking cherries for \$0.25/hour.

The *Farmerette Movement*, a part of Ontario's history, has been overlooked, unrecognized, and unnoticed. But the change is a-coming! Let's go to Blyth! Let's get educated! Let's be entertained! Book your ticket now!

Each year, we mark March 21 as the **International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination**. It is a particular time to focus on anti-racist actions and to dismantling racism in all its forms. This international day has been observed around the world every year since 1966.

In the United Church, we honour this important day. As the United Church's anti-racism policy reminds us, the struggle against racism is a continuous effort. This means that anti-racism work is important on any day and every day.

Here are 10 suggestions to work towards anti-racism from The United Church of Canada.

- 1. **Take tangible actions locally.** You might be inspired by what people in United Church congregations and networks are already doing about anti-racism. What faithful actions might you take in your own context?
- **2. Join a community of practice.** A new online gathering starting April 11, called <u>Wait—Is This Racist?</u> is based on the popular book of the same name. This gathering aims to be a community of practice. Sign up through CHURCHx.
- 3. Download the United Church anti-racism app. We have recently updated the design for our mobile app called AR4YT (Anti-Racism for Youth Training). It's available from Apple's App Store and Google Play. The app was designed by Black youth aged 18-22 who are members of the United Church. Although the app is youth oriented, it can also be used by adults who want to learn about becoming anti-racist.
- **4. Explore the priorities of the United Church Foundation.** Two of the four priorities focus on anti-racism and on reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples. In addition to reading about this work, financial gifts to the Foundation can support anti-racism efforts.
- **5. Explore anti-racism education.** Several new courses explore anti-racism education. Upcoming courses include Racial Justice for White Ministers in North America, Racial Justice for White Lay Leaders, and What Now? Action Plans to Dismantle Systemic Racism. Or, watch the recordings from a recent course that focused on antisemitism and anti-Judaism within Christianity, featuring faculty from our United Church theological schools and guests. Recordings will be available on CHURCHx.
- **6.** Coming soon! Pick up a copy of *I Am a Changemaker*, the new anti-racism children's resource. This brand-new United Church of Canada curriculum is written for leaders of children aged 6–12 who are looking for ways to teach anti-racism, raise anti-racist children, and advance racial equity in a faith-based and supportive way. It will be available in the <u>United Church Bookstore</u> at the beginning of April.
- 7. Financially support Indigenous-led initiatives. Support healing and language programs for Indigenous Residential School Survivors and their families by giving a gift to the United Church's Healing Fund. You can also support the Indigenous and Racialized Youth Gathering by offering financial support to Mission and Service and through your prayer support.
- **8. Read about Leadership Counts!** Results are out about the United Church's <u>identity-based</u> <u>survey</u> about leadership! You can learn more about who our leaders are—our ministry personnel and members of national committees—through the mid-term report.
- **9. Review the 40 Days of Engagement on Anti-Racism.** Have you had a chance to read the most recent <u>written reflections</u>? They are all available online. You may also want to view some of the recordings of the live events on the United Church's YouTube channel. The ones on <u>Indigenous Identity in the Christian Church</u> and <u>environmental racism</u> were particularly popular.
- **10. Pray and sing justly.** Pray continuously! And explore ways to sing justly in your community of faith. The United Church's <u>Then Let Us Sing! music portal</u> offers principles to consider around copyright justice and musical misappropriation.
